Although I'm a pretty hardcore Libertarian, I support our state's "minimum wage"; \$7.50/hr here in California.

But I oppose the concept of a "living wage" (taken locally to mean about \$24 per hour).

Are these different words for the same concept, differing only in the amount?

No.

I agree with most of Mark's reasoning--if applied to the higher wage--and would therefore be on the same side of an argument about the "living wage". But different phenomena prevail below say \$10/hr.

A free market only works as libertarians describe when all participants are informed, competent, and uncoerced.

The problem is that people whose lack of skills makes them minimum wage earners tend also to be poorly informed, less competent (if only as negotiators), and more easily intimidated.

Mark's post implies that those who are currently employed at \$7.50/hr must be worth that much, or they'd be replaced by another business method (e.g. automation).

Let's accept that hypothesis. Now, what if the state minimum wage were lowered, or failed to increase with inflation? Would those employees' wages grow apace with inflation (because they are worth that much, as posited), or slide closer to the national minimum wage (\$5.15/hr).

I believe they would slide (or at best stagnate at \$7.50). If you disagree, there's no point in arguing further. If you agree, I hope you'd consider the minimum wage a reasonable protection; and probably the simplest form such a protection could take.

Ironically, I reached this conclusion after observing how easily well paid "exempt" engineers can be abused by their employers; browbeaten into working 5 or 10 extra hours each week for no extra pay. If they couldn't stand up to their bosses I realized that most minimum wage employees probably wouldn't be able to either, absent minimum wage and hourly pay laws.

Based on my observation of engineers, I support overtime laws for all employees. I say "Let the market freely determine the value of 40 hours of an employee's time, then the law needs to protect that wage or it will tend to be eroded wherever there is a combination of unethical managers and nonconfrontational employees."

Christopher says "A free market only works as libertarians describe when all participants are informed, competent, and uncoerced." First, "uncoerced" is a big part of the definition of free market.

I disagree that ALL participants need to be informed and competent for the free market to 'work.' Clearly the more informed I am, the better I will do as a buyer in a free market. And the more competent I am, the better I will do as a seller. So the free market provides incentives for people to be informed and competent. But even the uninformed will benefit as a result of the more informed.

Surely a person unhappy working for minimum wage has an incentive to look for a better paying job and only stays where he is because there isn't a better job available. And if he loses his job because of an increase in the minimum wage, is he better off?

And if there should be a minimum wage, then you would agree there should be a minimum price for all products and services in the market, since the producers won't be able to pay wages unless they get some minimum price. What good is a minimum wage to people who are unemployed? Don't we need a law requiring everyone to have a job? How would that work?

If there were fewer unskilled workers than positions available, the free market would raise the 'minimum' wage. So the question might be why do we have more unskilled workers than we need? Might it have something to do with the fact they were educated in government-run schools? Or might the drag of government on our economy be causing fewer jobs to be available? And what effect does inflating the money supply have on those working for a minimum wage?

And why should some bureaucrat be concerned about the wages of some 'browbeaten' engineers? If there is competition for engineers, they will leave the demanding (unethical?) employer for one that offers better working conditions. If not, engineers will likely be happy to work extra hours to keep their jobs, and help to keep their company in business, or some will make a career change.

I am not expert in how to profit from a depression.

As far as I know, the Great Depression lowered real estate prices in America. For example, according to <http://www.realtor.org/vlibrary.nsf/pages/amf2006>, in early 1934, U.S. Secretary of Commerce Daniel Roper, speaking to the Philadelphia Real Estate Board, said 1933 "recorded the greatest amount of liquidation in the history of real estate over any previous 12 months' period." He added that low real estate values and declining sales had weakened the building and construction industries. In summary of Roper, the values (in other words, the prices) of real estate declined in 1933. Many sources support the conclusion that real estate prices declined during the Great Depression, not just in 1933. By the way, real estate prices also dropped in East Asia during its 1997, severe recession. Buyers usually borrow most of the purchase price of real estate. During a depression, many potential buyers no longer qualify for loans. Furthermore, many potential buyers who qualify for loans during a depression become pessimistic about their economic future and therefore decide not to borrow. As a result, sellers of real estate during a depression often sell for what ordinarily would merely be a down payment. I think that this is an important reason why real estate prices seem to decline during depressions.

According to "Descent Into the Depths (1930)" by Dan Blatt, which is at http://www.futurecasts.com/Depression_descent-end-'30.html, silver had cost 65 cents per ounce in 1926, before the depression. The price declined sharply toward the end of 1930. It hit 30 cents

at the end of 1930 and 26 1/2 cents on 7 February 1931. The price of silver crashed in May 1931, when the Chinese Reserve Bank stopped buying silver. In conclusion, the depression seems to have driven down the price of silver. I don't claim that it is common for the price of silver to decline during depressions.

As far as I know, the price of gold in America, and I guess elsewhere, rose during the Great Depression. I guess that buying gold (for example, bars of gold which weigh a kilo or a fraction of a kilo) before a depression, then selling the bars during a depression, is a good way to profit from a depression. Some jurisdictions do not allow people to own bars of gold.

Second, as an investor, I make a distinction between investments and speculation. The former is low risk and the latter is high risk. As Doug Casey says, investors look for a 90% chance to make a 10% return, while speculators look for a 10% chance to make a 100% return (or something to that effect).

I consider going to college as an investment, since it is low risk if I had good grades in high school and am prepared to put in the effort. Similarly, becoming a garbage man is also low risk, in that I know what to expect, both in terms of pay and job satisfaction.

None of this is meant to detract from your point. We all need to think about the future (speculate if you will), make a decision, take action and live with the consequences, good or bad. Socialists believe we should be protected from the consequences of our bad decisions and penalized for our good ones.

Oil production will now begin to decline terminally.

Within a year or two, it is likely that oil prices will skyrocket as supply falls below demand. OPEC cuts could exacerbate the gap between supply and demand and drive prices even higher.

Independent studies indicate that global crude oil production will now decline from 74 million barrels per day to 60 million barrels per day by 2015. During the same time, demand will increase. Oil supplies will be even tighter for the U.S. As oil producing nations consume more and more oil domestically they will export less and less. Because demand is high in China, India, the Middle East, and other oil producing nations, once global oil production begins to decline, demand will always be higher than supply. And since the U.S. represents one fourth of global oil demand, whatever oil we conserve will be consumed elsewhere. Thus, conservation in the U.S. will not slow oil depletion rates significantly.

Alternatives will not even begin to fill the gap. There is no plan nor capital for a so-called electric economy. And most alternatives yield electric power, but we need liquid fuels for tractors/combines, 18 wheel trucks, trains, ships, and mining equipment. The independent scientists of the Energy Watch Group conclude in a 2007 report titled: "Peak Oil Could Trigger Meltdown of Society."

"By 2020, and even more by 2030, global oil supply will be dramatically lower. This will create a supply gap which can hardly be closed by growing contributions from other fossil, nuclear or alternative energy sources in this time frame."

With increasing costs for gasoline and diesel, along with declining taxes and declining gasoline tax revenues, states and local governments will eventually have to cut staff and curtail highway maintenance. Eventually, gasoline stations will close, and state and local highway workers won't be able to get to work. We are facing the collapse of the highways that depend on diesel and gasoline powered trucks for bridge maintenance, culvert cleaning to avoid road washouts, snow plowing, and roadbed and surface repair. When the highways fail, so will the power grid, as highways carry the parts, large transformers, steel for pylons, and high tension cables from great distances. With the highways out, there will be no food coming from far away, and without the power grid virtually nothing modern works, including home heating, pumping of gasoline and diesel, airports, communications, and automated building systems.

Domaineering is the web-based marketing business of acquiring and monetizing Internet domain names focusing on their use specifically as an advertising medium rather than primarily speculating on domains as intellectual property investments for resale as in domaining where generating advertising revenue is considered more of a bonus while awaiting a sale. In essence, the domain names function as virtual Internet billboards with generic domain names being highly valued for their revenue generating potential derived from attracting Internet traffic hits. Revenue is earned as potential customers view pay per click (PPC) ads or the Internet traffic attracted may be redirected to another website. Hence, the domain name itself is the revenue generating asset conveying information beyond just functioning as a typical web address. As the value here is intrinsically in the domain name and not in a website's products

or services, these domains are developed for advertising, (i.e, "parked"), and not into "conventional" websites. As with traditional advertising, domaineering is part art and part science. Often to be the most effective as an advertising tool, the domain names and their corresponding landing pages must be engineered or optimized to produce maximum revenue which may require considerable skill and keen knowledge of search engine optimization (SEO) practices, marketing psychology and an understanding of the target market audience. Domaineering generally utilizes a firm offering domain parking services to provide the sponsored "feed" of a word or phrase searched for thus creating a mini-directory populated largely by advertisers paying to promote their products and services under a relevant generic keyword domain. Occasionally content is added to develop a functional mini-website. Domaineers contend that their product, i.e., "domain advertising", is a bona fide offering of goods or services in and of itself which provides rights to and legitimate interests in the generic domains they use. This serves as a rebuttal or defense in addressing occasional accusations of cybersquatting. Domaineers and some of those who advertise online using keywords believe domaineering provides a useful, legal and legitimate Internet marketing service while opponents of domaineering decry the practice as increasing the ubiquitous commercialization of the world wide web. Domaineering aka "domain advertising" is practiced by both large organizations which may have registered hundreds or even thousands of domains to individual entrepreneurial minded domaineers who may only own one or a few. The earliest known verifiable identification and defining of domaineering as a distinct Internet advertising practice is attributed to Canadian Professor William Lorenz.
